"Drew Pearson to Address Utes Tonight": National columnist Drew Pearson will speak tonight on his syndicated column "The Washington Merry- Go-Round." He is scheduled to speak at 8:15 pm in the Union Ballroom. The title caused controversy within the nation's capital, as the published a sequel "More Merry-Go-Round" resulted in Pearson's dismissal from the Baltimore Sun.

"NSA President Appears Today": National Student Assn. President Richard Redding will hold a meeting in the Union Board Room at 2 pm. There will be delegates from five Utah colleges attending to evaluate where Time stands on the NSA's policies and to decide if affiliation should be continued. NSA has been accused of avoiding direct concern with students, but Redding will be there to defend the national officers.

"Parking Blocked": The construction of the new bookstore causes parking east of the Geology Building to be blocked off. The Traffic Committee announced a position in it's membership. All applications are due to Bob Bradford no later than 4 pm Monday in the ASUU office.

"Ute Defendants Acquitted in Student Court": Defendants were cleared from a charge on Thursday that stated they were disobeying the rules under the election bill of the ASSU Constitution. Jack Shoenhals of the defense team argued that the bill is invalid because it wasn't published within the five day limit. The elections bill approved on Jan. 28 didn't appear in the Chronicle until about a week later. ASUU second vice president Steve Brockbank described how every eligible candidate was required to have this information.

"Browsing Room Slates Music Fare": Music 1 has required listening selections to be played in the Union Browsing Room on Mondays and Wednesdays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m and on Thursdays from 5 p.m to 7 p.m. The program is designed to allow students to access mandatory selections after Music Hall hours.

"Fall Festival Featured By AMS Sponsors": On Nov. 19, the Fall Festival sponsored by AMS will be held in the Union Ballroom at 8:30 pm. Each building will have a park area as well as a play area for both children and adults.
