"Utes Vote Today on Offices, Referendums": Elections are going on throughout the campus to select 1960-1961 Associated Students of the University of Utah (ASUU) president, vice presidents, coordinator, secretary, and treasurer. The election also determines the retention of University membership in the National Student Association. There is also the election of officers of the Women's Recreation Association. The image shows the presidential candidates Dellenbach and Brockbank in the debate on campaign issues and students government problems.

"Hopefuls Brockbank, Dellenbach Reveal Presidential Platforms": Steve Brockbank, an ASUU President candidate, proposes that student senators would be appointed to serve on the student-faculty committees. The meetings would be open to the public and form more reliable communication and liaison between the student government and students. Bob Dellenbach, another candidate, announces that the Senate would form an evaluation committee to earn the respect of the faculty and the opportunity to lead out for the students.

"Thomson, Carpenter List Formal 1st Veep Stands": Jon Carpenter, an ASUU 1st Vice President candidate, supports to maintain in National Student Association. He proposes the amendment providing Senate seats for the five class officers in each class. Carpenter also offers to formulate better foreign student programs. He would revise the ASUU budget to provide better services to the larger interest groups on campus. He believes the close coordination with the Exec Council is significant.

"2nd Vice Pres. Candidates State Views": Steve Swindle argues that there should be better communication between the student and the student court. Swindle states that the school needs more legal advisors for the Executive Council. Jon West asserts that coordination between the Executive Council, the Senate, Student Court, student-faculty committees, administration, *Chronicle*, and the students is fundamental.

"Peace Corps": The discussion on the youth peace crops will be held at noon in Orson Spencer Hall auditorium. The student body is invited. Pres. A. Ray Olpin, Harold W. Bentley, Mr. Chuck Akerlow, and Miss Martha Hales will make a speech, moderated by John Benion.

"Issues' Campaign Shakes Quiet ASUU Campus Election Scene": The ASUU Executive Council issued a statement which student groups can vote during the election. The election allows the class officers to keep the prestige of their present titles while assuming new duties as ASUU senators. The class officers shall perform the duties traditionally. Official procedures are already in practice. The Student Court asked to remove referendum campaign signs, and the Executive Council rejected the request. A possible "delayed action" was newly added to the constitution. Bud Billiter, court chief justice, said that it was not the court decision to put down the campaign posters or not.
