"Understand the World, Dr. Heaton Urges in Lecture":

Dr. Herbert Heaton issued a plea at the annual Phi Alpha Theta lecture on a Friday night. The meaning behind the plea was that the United States was being drug into a concept of leadership adapted by the world in which our nation is lead to understand ideas such as allies, neutrals, and uncommitted people. The meaning behind this is to assume that the United States should only have dealings, or as Heaton is quoted, "remote political connection with their mother country" which would be Great Britain. Also, Heaton showed that as much as a nation grows over the course of time, it should also recognize the need to look after itself and its interests.

"Reynolds Talk Features Dean":

Dr. Sydney Angleman, Dean of the College of Letters and Science and director of General Education was the speaker featured in the annual Reynolds lecture, given in Kingsbury Hall. The Reynolds lecture is named after the first director of the Extension Division Fredrick J. Reynolds and was established in his honor. Listed later in the article is a brief summary of Angleman and her path through her studies, as well as more information of her activity in programs throughout the community and the University.

"MacNamara Sees Barriers to Rehabilitation," by Bob Finney:

The Dean of the New York Institute of Criminology, Donal E.J. MacNamara, believed that there is a lack of psychological help due to the stigma given off by the public about criminals, and that this was preventing successful rehabilitation plans for them. MacNamara said that many released criminals were finding their way back to prison, and a large part of the reason why is that prisons lacked psychiatrists, psychologists, and social workers needed to offer sufficient rehabilitation to the inmates. Also part of the stigma against the criminals is that once they were out of prison, all they wanted to do was return.

"Let Penalties Fit Person Authority Says," by James Cook

Donal E. J. MacNamara, dean of the New York Institute of Criminology, stated that crimes will not decrease with increased and stricter verdicts, but rather with proper rehabilitation. He later added that if the criminal was viewed as an individual instead of a statistic, that more progress could be made in the fight against increased crime rates. The article continues on to offer advice as to simple steps that individuals can take to avoid crime in their communities. MacNamara also adds that these simple steps will probably not be followed due to the fact that people are, "too damn careless to do them." Statistics about the crime rate in Utah compared to the national average are added and interesting to review.

"Astronomer to Discuss Galaxies 'n their Influence"

Noted astronomer and lecturer, Dr. Harlow Shapley, discussed "Galaxies and What They Do to Us" in Kingsbury Hall. Shapley was acclaimed for his major discoveries and contributions in the field of astronomy. Later in the article, Shapley's work and positions are listed out in detail as to why he was chosen and acclaimed in the way that he was. Shapley was a recipient of honorary degrees from an impressive 15 universities and was an honorary foreign member of national academies of ten different countries.

The Atlantic heads of state from the previously mentioned countries refuse to meet unless the Soviet Union changes their stance.
